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St Cyprian's Retreat Church Lads' and Girls' Brigade celebrates 100th anniversary



St Cyprian's Church Lads'and Girls' Brigade was established on 15 July 1924 in an area called Raapkraal, which would later become Kirstenhof. The area consisted of corrugated bungalows that were given to ex-army and airforce members after the 1st WW. The first OC was Lt. J Mampies and the Chaplain was the Revd H Thompson. There was a state of limbo somewhere between the 1930 anda reopening on 1 November 1936. The company did not close, but there was no place to meet as people were being moved from Raapkraal to Retreat, Steenberg and Cafda, because Raapkraal was declared a whites only area. A Church and hall were built between Retreat station and Main Road and this is where the brigade flourished.

The records show that the OC in 1936 was Lt. S. Holland and the Chaplain was the Revd C. J. Skett. Revd Skett went to England in 1936 to register the company. There were companies that were started before St. Cyprian's, namely St Paul's, St Phillip's, St.Saviour's and St Mark's. Unfortunately, these companies were closed because of the Group Areas Act.

In 1950 John de Wet became Captain. He was revered for being one of the best drill instructors in the regiment at that time. In 1954 William "Boeta Baan" van Reenen became assistant band Master. He would go on to not only become Band Master but also Senior Squad commander until well into the 1980's. He was the recipient

of the Order of St Simon of Cyrene award in 2003 at the age of 95. He remained a loyal member of the brigade until his passing at the age of 99. In 1959 a contingent of 11 officers and lads of the Cape Town regiment was chosen to represent SA at the Royal Review in England. Among them was Sgt/Drummer William van Reenen. They set sail from CT on the Arundel Castle on June 20 1958.

In 1960, Lt. David Adams, the father of Retired Provost David Adams became OC due to the suspension of Capt De Wet. In 1964, Lt Peter Peters would become Captain and lead the company until 2001. It was during this period that the late Col Casper Adams approached the company and asked if they would be willing to play at Christmas Parties for the Rotary Club.




Church of the Resurrection Substance Abuse Support group volunteers needed

St Cyprian's Brigage 100th from page 1: We don't know who approached Col Adams or why he approached our company, as he was Major of the second battalion at that time. Maybe it was because he was the designated driver of the truck that had to transport the band members to the venues, and so it was easier for him seeing as he lived in Retreat. According to the Adams siblings it was

because St Cyprian's was always his favourite company. In those years we played at two venues every evening, starting in late November and going on until approximately 22 December. The parties started at Silverhurst farm which would later move to Groot Constantia farm, where we are still playing at Uncle Paul's parties for Wynberg Rotary Club, a partnership which we cherish and has been ongoing for close on 70 years. We also played in Rondebosch but it later became a problem, because when the Contantia party would run late we would then be late getting to Rondebosch. In 1978/79 we approached St Andrew's Steenberg and enquired whether they would play at the Rondebosch parties, and they accepted.

We also had an amazing working committee who would raise funds for uniforms and winter jackets for the lads. The committee included, Mrs. Sally Lucas, Mr & Mrs Arendse, Mrs. Tabisher, Mrs. Neutt, Mrs. Caroline Dowman, Mrs. Caroline Solomons and Mrs. Doreen Peters. Sgt. Major W. Wyngaardt was chairman of the committee.

In the early 60's to 70's we had such legendary bandsmen like D/M Harry Wyngaardt, Drummers, Basil Adams, Andrew Stoffels. Moses Arendse (who was also a bugler), Willie van Reenen, on Bass Drum we had Anthony le Roux, Flutist, David and Leslie Williams, Isaac (Ikey) and Adrian Albertus and of course Band Master van Reenen, Buglers, Vicky Wyngaard, Edward Herman and Cedrick Poggenpoel among others.

In 1971, then Sgt/Maj William Wyngaardt, received the Gallant Conduct Medal for Bravery, after saving 2 people from drowning at Koggel Baai. We not only participated and excelled at drill and band but also in PT and athletics. As juniors we would meet at 6pm and start with PT led by

Albert Fynn. So our parade nights which was and still is on Monday's, would start with PT at 6pm followed by drum lessons with Sgt. Willie van Reenen at 7 and then a short band practice at 7.30 and then brigade would start at 8pm and close at 10pm. Most people used to walk to brigade in that era and we all used to walk home after brigade. Those going to Retreat andnCafda would walk down Retreat Road and people would peel off as theyngot to their respective avenues and those going to Heathfield, would walknalong the railway line.

In 1974, the church was relocated from behind Retreat Station to our current premises, in 5th Avenue, Retreat, due to the group areas act. We also participated in battalion and regimental athletics meetings. Here athletes like, Cedric Courie, David Daniels, Graham and Wayne Arendse, Merlin Julie, Peter and Clive Doren, Leonard Peters, Tony, Deon and Shane Sepkitt, Shawn Phillips, Roland Farrad and Giovani Bake comes to mind.

In 1995 we sent a delegation of 6 lads to England. They were, David Williams, Andrew Adams, Donovan Peters, Ronald Steeneveld and Keith and Steven Laguma.

St Cyprian's has not only been a very competitive company, but it was instilled in us by Boeta Baan and our officers to reach out and help any company who requested assistance with drill or music. Often one of us, either Myself, Uncle Dave Williams or Cedric Poggenpoel would accompany Boeta Baan to Abbottsdale or to 'Die Slot' (Uniting Reformed Church brigade) in Grassy Park, or any other company that required assistance to help them prepare/teach their band for competitions. It didn't matter if bands were competing against us, we would teach them exactly how we interpreted the music. It was up to whoever was best on the day to win the competition. We were often perceived as being aloof, but that could not have been further from the truth. On the field we were fierce competitors, with companies like Good Shepherd Maitland, St Andrew, Steenberg, Abbottsdale and Malmesbury wanting to beat us at drill and band. We were competitors on the field, but off the field many close friendships were formed with lads from other companies.

In the early to mid-1990's the CGB and CLB were supposed to amalgamate as had happened in England, but the CGB HQ decided to close their regiment rather than amalgamate. When 2 of our CGB ladies, namely Sandra Adams and Elvereen Wyngaadt wanted to join the CLB, there was great push back from traditionalists in our company who resisted the move of girls joining the lads brigade, and they were told that we were not accepting girls. Elvereen then went to join Simon of Cyrene, Parkwood. In 1995 we decided to accept girls into the CLB and in 2019 Elvereen went on to become the first female Captain and she is still currently the Captain of St Cyprian's Church Lads' and Girls' Brigade.

Who are the AWF and what do they do?

History of Anglican Women's Fellowship (AWF)

The AWF was founded by the late Archbishop Robert Selby Taylor. The inaugural meeting was held at St Benedict's House, Rossettenville Johannesburg from 30th March to 2nd April 1965.

The first conference was held from 16th-18th October1968. Mrs Doris Gregorowski was elected as first Provincial President. The Archbishop of the Anglican Church of Southern Africa is the Patron of the AWF in the Province. Members are recognised by wearing of the official AWF badge.

The Patron Saints are the sisters Mary and Martha and are commemorated throughout the Province (ACSA) on the last Saturday or Sunday of July each year (APB Mary & Martha - July).

Who can join?

AWF is open to all confirmed Anglican persons over the age of 18 years who share in the worship and work of the Church. Anyone wishing to be admitted as an AWF member must attend branch fellowship meetings for at least 6 consecutive months and participate in fellowship activities.

Why the AWF?

The Anglican Women's Fellowship is an all-inclusive organisation for women sharing in the church's ministry. Guided by the Bishops, AWF Chaplains and clergy.

The AWF helps unite women in the church and effectively in its work, prayer worship, witness and mission to the broader community in which members live and to the world.

The AWF does not replace or compete with existing organisations for church women.

How AWF Functions

The Branch is a working unit of the AWF and meet at least once a month.

Parish groups, e.g. Lay ministers, Choir, Altar Servicers may also be affiliated to the AWF.

To keep the branch fellowship operating smoothly, branch executives are elected at an AGM for a one term of office (equivalent to 2 years) and may be re-elected for a second term (4years). The Executive consists of Chairperson, Deputy Chairperson, Secretary and Treasurer (and their assistants).

To keep the branch fellowship operating smoothly, AWF have policies, processes and procedures in place stipulated in AWF Provincial Constitution.

At each branch fellowship Unit Committees are formed to ensure that projects and programmes are implemented as follows:

- Prayer and Spirituality (Bible Study)
- Action Outreach and Social Issues
- Finance and Administration
- Human Resource
- Marketing

Each branch fellowship has a representative to the diocese, and each diocese has two delegates to Provincial Council Meetings, usually the Diocesan President or her appointed representative and a delegate who is elected from among the diocesan members **Services and Events**

Services are arranged by Dioceses, Archdeaconries and Branch fellowships. It is a time when members get together to worship God and have blessed fellowship with one another.

- Mary and Martha Services (July)
- Day of Compassion Events (August)
- Dorcas Today Events (October)
- Mjikelo (June)
- Fundraising events are organised to augment the income of dioceses and branch fellowships. This money will be used for outreach projects.

VTS empowers ACSA



Young people are leaders of today! A group of 10 Young Leaders from ACSA were selected for the Virginia Theological Seminary (VTS) Young Leaders Program. The Diocese of Cape Town was represented by Chenay Nagel (All Saints, Roodebloem) and Melissa Awu (St. Paul, Rondebosch), and two from our neighbouring Dioceses, Lubabalo Qosi (Diocese of False Bay) and Corne Resandt (Diocese of Saldanha Bay).

This program, funded by Trinity Church Wall Street, USA, is part of the Anglican Communion. The partnership originated from Revd Canon Natalie Arendse's sabbatical visit to VTS in November 2023. Revd Canon Natalie and Revd Canon Dr Percy Chinganga (Rector of the College of Transfiguration) teamed up to lead the program, with the assistance of Bishop Stephen Diseko, Dean of the Province.

The program consisted of 7 online sessions, each lasting 2 hours, with facilitators from around the globe, including Prof. Ian Nel (Stellenbosch University), Prof. Miranda Pillay (UWC), and our very own Revd Canon Natalie. The topics covered were: Theology of Leadership, Strategic Thinking & Conflict Management, Congregational Leadership, Family Systems, Anglican Communion & the Importance of Ecumenical & Interfaith Relations, Church Administration & Management, Leading while Young & Project Design & Management and Human Dignity. The program concluded with a retreat held at Carmel, George. This was the first time the group gathered in person, providing ample opportunities to share and learn from one another. We were also excited to see a familiar face on the VTS team—our very own PYC President Emeritus, Ms. Nonhlanhla Shezi, a student at VTS. Noni, as she is affectionately known, served as the student assistant supporting the program. The participants were given the opportunity to share their projects, which they will be working on for the remainder of the course. The presentations were of high standard, and we all left feeling excited and inspired! We were blessed by the presence of the Bishop of George, who also joined and presided over the final Eucharist.

As we look ahead, we are excited and expectant to see how each project will positively impact the lives of others both within and beyond the Anglican space. The innovative ideas and commitment demonstrated by these young leaders promise to bring about meaningful change and growth. We encourage more young people to be bold and open to stepping into leadership roles within the church.



The future holds great potential for these emerging leaders, and we are eager to support and witness their contributions as they continue to shape a vibrant and inclusive Anglican community.


Careers development workshop

St Paul's, Rondebosch, held a workshop for tertiary students on Saturday 3 August, 2024. Entitled: "So I have got my degree: Now What?" the participants were asked to think ahead to a working life beyond the safe confines of university study. Reflecting on their past and current experiences of working rather than studying, the group identified both the useful and negative features of working life. They were asked to consider what strengths, weaknesses, needs and potential they might bring to a future job situation. Also, what desirable workplace skills were essential, such as familiarity with excel, an ability to remember names and faces and proficiency with email etiquette. These were brainstormed, as were desirable qualities such as initiative, patience, punctuality and courtesy.

The second half of the morning was taken up with a simulation game where half the group were interviewees and half were applicants for a job they sorely needed. Everyone had the chance to try out both roles but there was hearty agreement that being interviewed for a job was far more stressful than being a potential employer! Overall, the workshop intended to jolt students into considering of the ways in which employment makes different demands to those required by study and it is worthwhile, whilst still a student, to undertake some preparation for this change. The workshop was the brainchild of Mbasa Bashman and Gay Morris, two of St Paul's Parish Councillors.







ASF 2024 Conference in Lesotho

The Anglican Students Federation Conference brought a lot of excitement and anticipation for the participants from the Western Cape Region as it was a first for most. Although the trip to Lesotho was rather long, the company, together with the free breakfast and supper on the way, made the trip more bearable. Upon arrival in Maseru, we got our passports stamped and had a "long walk" into Lesotho. After a few pitstops in between and getting lost, we finally arrived at the conference venue where we waited for the rest of the regions to arrive.

The Welcoming Eucharist Service led by the Bishop of Lesotho, The Rt Revd Dr. Vincentia Kgabe, kicked off the conference. After dinner we made our way to our digs to settle in and prepare for the rest of the conference.

Day Two started rather early with its focus on the unpacking of the theme which focussed on Nehemiah's journey in rebuilding the walls of Jerusalem and asking how we can apply this to the current issues we face as ASF. Our very own Mel Awu led the interactive bible study as we split into groups and had discussions based on questions prepared around this scripture.



A wonderful worship service and talk, led by Rev Bruce Woolley and his team, educated us on the importance of "Growing the church" and "Anglicans Ablaze" in the church. Day Three had many talks and discussions with the first being with "Green Anglicans" led by the Green Anglicans Rep – Bino Makhalenyane and his team.

HOPE Africa followed with an interactive discussion on the crisis of Gender Based Violence and the use and resources available in the SAFE CHURCH provisions. The rest of the day comprised a very long and wearying AGM led by the incumbent PEC. The AGM briefly touched on the Portfolio reports as a precursor to what followed in the AGM. A wonderful and heartfelt candlelight service was held as a break away from the AGM honouring those who have left us as a memorial.

The Forth Day was mainly about the AGM parts Two and Three which



went over the reports and issues ASF currently faces. During a break a short games night was arranged where all the regions were put into different teams and competed in a series of games. Time was set aside too to allow God's Spirit to effect a "spiritual revival" to strengthen us to stand strong in the face of a major crisis facing young people: Unemployment.

The following day consisted of an excursion which started at an outreach centre for children where we all played with the children and donated supplies for them. We then proceeded to the most dreadful hike up the very steep Thaba Bosiu where we were taught about the history of the Basotho clan, how Moshoeshoe defeated their rivals and how the chiefdom has been ruling the nation of Lesotho. Unfortunately, the long-anticipated Clash of the Choirs, despite the extensive amount of practice and Gala Dinner could not take place as the AGM ran overtime with the discussions.

Elections were held afterwards, where our very own Karabo Rabaloi was elected General Secretary of the Province. The final day came with the closing service and we all went our separate ways back to our regions and homes.
